Changes after the Easter holiday – important please read!

After the Easter holiday we are going to revert to our pre-Covid timings of the school start and finish time. Rather than entering through the classroom doors, we will go back to children being dropped off on the main yard in the morning. This means that children will be able to **come round onto the yard from 8.15am** (before school child care still available from 8am). This gives them a few minutes to play first thing. We will then line them up for an **8.30am start time**. We still ask that adults dropping off children do not linger on site and socially distance where possible.

Pick up time will return to 3pm for the main school (from 2.45 for nursery) but will still be **from our classroom side doors** as we find this works well at the end of the day.

Other Covid precautions – hand-washing, hygiene and cleaning routines, catch-it, kill-it & bin-it, having windows open and seeking to work outside where appropriate will remain in place for the time being. Our day on Holy Island

The children also spent the day on Holy Island on Thursday. The weather wasn't the best we've had, but it did add to the authenticity of the re-creation of the launch of the Lizzie Porter lifeboat in a storm! The children enjoyed recreating the rescue of the James B Graham crew which hit the rocks around Holy Island 100 years ago this year. We were fortunate enough to meet up with Dick Patterson and Thelma Dunne who both have ancestors that took part in the rescue. The children are producing some lovely work linked to this rescue and hopefully this will go on display on Holy Island in the near future. In the afternoon, the children met with Helen from English Heritage to talk about updating the education offer linked to Lindisfarne Priory. We are looking forward to working on this project over the next few months!

In **Eco-Club** this week we did some activities relating to World Health Day on Thursday. The message from the World Health Organisation (WHO) is that **we only have one planet**, and our health depends on it, just like it's health depends on us.

We considered the repercussions of fossil fuels and pollution in the air that we breathe, the extreme weather and flooding caused by climate change, and the water scarcity which leads to the spread of disease in developing countries. We were shocked that hundreds of thousands of people die each year simply from diarrhoea.

We first looked at the Eatwell Plate and explored how to keep our bodies healthy through diet, exercise, and drinking water.



The children created their own eatwell plates using hula hoops and sorted the play food into fruit/veg, carbohydrates, proteins, dairy/alternatives, and oils/spreads. They then each created their own two-part exercise regime for everyone to follow e.g. ten star jumps and run on the spot for twenty seconds. We then looked at the importance of keeping our minds healthy as well as our bodies. We remembered Children's Mental Health week last month and some of the things we can do when we feel anxious or upset. We then did a guided meditation which the children enjoyed and found relaxing.
