


Curriculum update


After our fantastic visit last week from the dragons, the children have been planning and writing some excellent stories in the fantasy genre. Their imaginations have been sparked and they have some weird and wonderful ideas to make their stories stand out from the ordinary!

Class books for this topic, which we are using in English are as follows:

The Egg in class 1 and The Dragon Machine in class 2. We are also using The Boy Who Grew Dragons as a class reader.







The children in our phonics small groups have shown good progress and more children will be graduating from the Read Write Inc program this half term. My morning 'times tables' group has done very well with understanding the commutative law in multiplication, and they are increasing their scope and speed in different times tables depending on their age. The children are all working very well and we are really pleased with their positive attitude in the classroom. Well done everyone!

Being Safe

We are putting information for parents and carers onto our website about road safety. The reason this is so important is that, globally, road traffic incidents are the leading cause of death among children and young people. Younger children especially cannot accurately judge the speed of traffic and safe gaps in traffic in the way that adults can and should not be left unsupervised to cross even quiet roads alone. We will be doing safety sessions in school, but it is very important that parents and carers ensure that children stay safe when they are out and about and our children understand the key messages:

- How pedestrians walk safely on the pavement and vehicles use the road
- How to walk with an adult who they know and hold hands when walking near the road
- Safer crossing places and how to use them
- The Stop, Look, Listen and THINK sequence.
- How pedestrians walk on the pavement and vehicles travel on the road
- Places where it is not safe to cross the road

Eco-School News

This week at Eco-Schools Club we started our 5 activities to become Explorers for the Global Goals. This project is to link with our Global Citizenship Topic which will earn us our Green Flag Award. The first activity after meeting the Explorers was to create a 'Peace Path'. We first thought about what it meant to be 'peaceful' and agreed that it is the absence of war; which we know happens in lots of countries around the world. Then we thought about how we could create a Peace Path. The children agreed that it would be:

- -Nice to walk on
- -Relaxing
- -Quiet
- -Feel safe
- -Be decorated and beautiful

At club we designed our own Peace Paths with features which were special to us. I have put these in a special folder dedicated to Eco-Schools art and designs.

Next week, along the edges of the short grass at the Remembrance Garden, we are going to add decorative touches such as painted stones and flowers, along with some bird feeders to make our path extra special. We decided they were; 3 (Good Health and Wellbeing), 11 (Sustainable cities and communities), 15 (Life on land) and 16 (Peace and Justice).

Next week as Explorers we will look at 'Little Homes'.
