- Year 1: Plurals—adding 'es' to words Eg catches, matches, witches, watches, kitchens
- Year 2: Adding 'es' to nouns and verbs ending in 'y'. The 'y' is changed to 'i' before 'es' is added.

Eg flies, tries, replies, copies, babies, carries

Year 3: Suffix exceptions

If the root word ends with 'le', the 'le' is changed to 'ly'.

Eg gently, simply, humbly, nobly

Year 4: the suffix 'ous' <u>rule 4</u>

If there is an 'i' sound before the 'ous', it is usually spelt as 'i' but some words have 'e'

Eg serious, obvious, hideous, spontaneous
